·Naval Officer Visits Sea Scouts.

An assurance of all possible help from the Navy to make the training of sea scouts more useful and effective was given by Capt. B. A. Samson, Chief of Personnel, Naval Headquarters, Delhi, when he visited East Madras Sea Scouts at their Shore Headquarters near Cooum Lock on 4-8-1952.

Capt. Samson expressed his appreciation of the "wonderful show" the Sea Scouts put up when they gave a demonstration of exercises. From the

service point of view, the Navy would like to have the Sea Scouts and "catch them young". Whether they joined the Army, the Navy or the Air Force, eventually, he felt that what was much more important was that their present training instilled in them a sense of discipline, and citizenship.

Earlier, Mr. V. S. Ratnasabhapathy, State Secretary, welcoming Capt. Samson said that the Sea Scouts felt encouraged by the visit of naval officers and hoped that the Government of India would help the Sea Scout organisation to develop on model lines and fit the sea scouts for service in various branches of the Navy.

Independence Day.

The 15th of August, 1952, is a great Day to Scouts and Guides. To day we celebrate the 5th Anniversary of our Independence. As a result of our achieving freedom many problems have had to be faced and solutions found. While they are being tackled, and tackled successfully by our great Leaders, one great task has been entrusted to our organisation and that is to train and prepare our young people both boys and girls to fit them up as worthy citizens of our country. This is by no means an easy task. But if there is one Organisation that can undertake this work successfully, it is the Bharat Scouts & Guides.

All over the State our Scouts and Guides will be celebrating the Day in a fitting manner. Madras is holding a Rally of Scouts and Guides attended by over 3,000 of them, under the presidency of His Excellency the Governor of Madras, Sri Sri Prakasa, who is a keen admirer of the Scouts and Guides Organisation. This is our first Rally after the State Council was formed and this indeed is a good beginning.

New Era in Free India.

The other day our Education Minister, Dr. M. V. Krishna Rao at a meeting of our organisation in North Madras said that the Bharat Scouts and guides are entering into a New Era, in Free India. It is left to The Association to take full advantage of the opportunity.

The State Jamboree.

Suggestions have been received from Districts that a State Jamboree should be held in December, 1953 and work should be taken up in connection with the Organisation of the Jamboree even from now. The matter will be considered by the Executive Committee and necessary steps will be taken in ine course.

The Central Camp.

In the meantime the City has planned for a central camp for 3 days during Christmas week this year (1952). A committee has been set up to work out details of the camp, and place them before the periodical conference to be held in September for approval. We hope similar camps will be organised by the Districts, also, since the value of the camp in the training of the young people is very great.

Editor.

Holding the Boy.

(By John Thurman, Camp Chief.)

Judging by many conversations I have had in recent months with Commissioners and Scouters the Movement seems, quite rightly, to be concerned about the number of boys we lose from Scouting.

I would like to stress that I believe it is right and it is certainly inevitable that a number of boys will come along to Cub Packs and Scout Troops to see whether or not they are going to like it, will find they do not like it and leave quite soon. I do not think we should be unduly excited about this as Scouting was never intended to appeal to every boy no more than any other game appeals to every boy, neither is Scouting a sort of patent medicine designed to cure every complaint to which boys are prone. Scouting will never serve all boys equally well. I hope, therefore, that we shall always be prepared to allow boys to try Scouting and, if it does not suit them, wish them good luck in some other sphere of activity.

I know to my cost as a Scoutmaster that if we spend a disproportionate amount of time worrying about the boys who have left that is the greatest single factor in ensuring that more boys will leave, for the simple reason that all of us have limited time to give to Scouting, and if we leave too little of that time to running our Packs and Troops in a proper manner then the standard will drop and boys will drift away. Boys who do not get on, get out. There is abundant evidence that the Cub who, after one and a half years, is still without his First Star is the boy who is going to drift away, likewise with the Scout of fourteen years of age who does not hold the Second Class Badge.

The boy who has remained in the Movement upto the stage of Investiture will only leave if Scouting becomes a dull routine and fails to provide fun, adventure, purpose and the activities he expects. Let us be quite honest with ourselves and recognise that when the boy leaves because the Scouting we offer him does not come up to his standard he is very right to do so. I believe completely that the answer to most of our leakage problems is to improve our standard.

I suggest that we look to our Group Council and make sure that it does accept its responsibilities for trying to help individual boys to get the best out of Sconting. The Group Council is not concerned with the business of the Group, that is the job of the

Committee, but it is concerned with training boys and if we will only recognise the fact that a far more to each individual boy in the Group than can be done by any one of us working alone then we begin to get real results and Group becomes a family.

Soon the census will be with us again. I wonder how many Group Scouters really look at the census as a reminder to do a little stock-taking. Especially in the cities we tend to have round about the same number of boys in each Pack and Troop every year, but the real question every Group must answer, is not "How many boys have you in the Troop?" but "How many boys are still in the Troop this year who were in Scouting last year?" Does all this matter? I am the first to agree that Scouting can offer benefit to the boy when he becomes a man even if he has only been in it for a short time, and I know many cases where this has proved to be true but, nonetheless, I think we expect rather a lot if we think the Scout Promise is going to be an integral part of a fellow's life if he has only been in Pack or Troop for a year or eighteen months. If we do not keep him longer then that we are depriving him, ourselves, and Scouting, of the opportunity of doing something of permanent value for him. I think that it matters tremendously which boys are in Scouting and that we are not merely content to sit down and say that we had twenty-four boys in the Pack last year and twenty-eight this year and therefore the Movement, and I hope they will always do so. Without advocating a "Closed Shop" policy I do say that the strength of a Group is very often measureable by the length of its waiting list.

May I suggest finally that every Group Council and every District Meeting of Scouters place on the next agenda the item "Holding the Boy".

Issue of Wood Badge Parchments and Beads

The question of the issue of the old Wood Badge Parchments and Beads to those who had done Part II, (Cub/Scout/Rover) prior to the merger of the Boy Scouts Association and the Hindustan Scout Association, has been receiving the attention of the National Organising Commissioner and National Camp Chief. He has asked me to issue the following instructions to those concerned

- 1. Those who have completed Part II only prior to the 7th November, 1950, should obtain the Part I papers, from the Nationa Headquarters, answer the questions and send the answers to the address given below not later than the 31st August, 1952.
- 2. Those who have finished Parts I & II, should get their commissioners to send up Part III to the same address, without any delay.
- 3. Those who have finished all the three Parts, should send in their certificates and full details to enable the Parchment and Beads to be issued.
- 4. No Parchments or Beads, under the old scheme, will be issued after the 7th November, 1952.
- 5. Scarves and Woggles can now be ordered from England. The price is 8s 11d. for a scarf, 2s. 6d. for a woggle and 6d. for beads, postage and customs duty extra. The total cost would be nearly Rs. 10 for a scarf, woggle and beads together.

Dear District Commissioners,

We are happy to inform you of the renewal of your warrant as District Commissioner for the year 1952-53, by the State Chief Commissioner. We congratulate you on the successful work that has been done in the past.

Now that the State Council of the Bharat Scouts and Guides has been formed and the whole work of the Association has been entrusted to it, it is up to us to infuse fresh life into the organisation and see that greater progress is made by every boy and girl enrolled into the movement.

This can only be possible, if the District Commissioners, in each district are active and vigilant in his/her work. The general condition has been that the boys/girls, remained mostly tenderfoots for years, rarely made progress reaching higher stages of efficiency from year to year, resulting in stagnation and ultimate dropping out of most of the boys/girls.

What therefore needs to be done is to see that the progress of each individual boy/girl is made measurable in every period of six months or one year. Then only can we increase efficiency.

If District Commissioners being the persons entrusted with this work are not only earnest but very active, efficiency will automatically improve

Planning is necessary and working out the Scout/Guide programme regularly is necessary. Visits to groups by Commissioners should as far as possible and convenient be undertaken every week and the Assistant District Commissioners made to supplement the work of the District Commissioners in this matter. We should therefore like to urge on you the necessity to attend to this work regularly though we know that the other duties of your profession etc., will demand your attention also. But when one takes up a work of this nature a certain minimum of time should be given to it. We do hope that you will give us every possible help and co-operation in making our organisation a Live Organisation full

of activity and progress. We have also the duty to train up younger people to take our places in due course. We want the Scouters/Guiders also take full share in planning and working.

A Quarterly Report Form for the District Commissioners to fill in, will be forwarded to you by the State Secretary, which please fill in for the September Quarter and send the same to us in the first week of October, 1952. May we add that the work you have taken up is a noble one and any help that is rendered through our organisation to our youngsters is really worthwhile and true service rendered to our Country and God.

The Madurai District Bharat Scouts & Guides.

A meeting of the Headmasters of the High Schools and Higher Elementary Schools in the Dindigul range was held at 5 p. m. on Friday, the 25th July in the premises of St. Mary,s High School, Dindigul. It was finally decided at the meeting that among the schools that were represented at the meeting, 11 scout troops and 10 cub packs were proposed to be started as quickly as possible.

With a vote of thanks proposed by Mr. Thillainayagam, Head-master of the Municipal High School, the meeting came to an end at 7-20 p. m.

A short report of the Famine Relief Work done by the Gokhale Rovers, North Madras.

Sri S. Audivaraham of Sri Gowthami Jeevakarunya Sangam, Rajahmundry was responsible for giving an opportunity to our Rovers to render service to the Famine stricken people at Chittoor. Our Rovers with their Senior Scouts availed of this opportunity and started the work on Saturday the 26th April'52. Sri C. S. Natesa Mudaliar, Vice-President of our District Association, inaugurated this service at the Brahmo Samajam Hall. Mr. S. Audivaraham and his associate Mr. B. V. Narayanaswami Naidu accompanied our Rovers at the door to door collections of old clothes. The Rovers with their Senior Scouts and other Scouts from T. T. V. High School, Brahmo Samajam Higher Elementary School, C. N. Orphanage, Vepery, Y.M.C.A. Boys' Town went street by street for 10 days and collected about 5,500 old clothes. The Hundi collection was inaugurated by Hon'ble Sri K. Venkataswami Naidu Garu by a liberal contribution. The Rovers extended their work in the West Madras area also with the kind permission of the District Commissioner, West Madras.

At a meeting of the North Madras Bharat Scouts and Guides held on 9th May '52, when Sri T. R. Kothandarama Mudaliar, Assistant State Commissioner presided. Sri K. Ramiah Chetti Garu, President of our Group Committee formally handed over 10 bundles of over 5,500 clothes to Sri Karunyananda Swamiji, founder, Gowthami Jeevakarunya Sangham, Rajahmundry, who came to Madras to bless our Rovers and Scouts on their sincere work. Messrs. V. S. Ratnasabhapathy, State Secretary, V. R. Ramanatha Iyer, President, North Madras Association, K. Govindachariar, Chairman, West Madras Executive Committee, T. Jayarama Mudaliar. member, Group Committee, spoke on the occassion and congratulated the Rovers and Scouts on their splendid work done in the cause of the famine stricken of Chittoor.

Our District Commissioner with 8 other Rovers of our Group paid a visit to 15 gruel centres of Vepanjeri area during their three days stay.

Within another 10 days they were able to collect about 5,600 clothes. Mr. B. Lajapathi Rai, one of our Rovers stayed at Bangalore for 10 days and was able to receive a gift parcel of over 850 clothes from the Bangalore Scouts.

The group was able to depute one of the parents of our Group Sri B. V. Narayanaswami Naidu Garu for a full time seevice of 8 months in the villages.

The Group lowes a lot to our District Commissioner, Mr. M. Ram Mohan, for his personal leadership.
