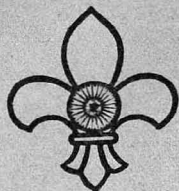


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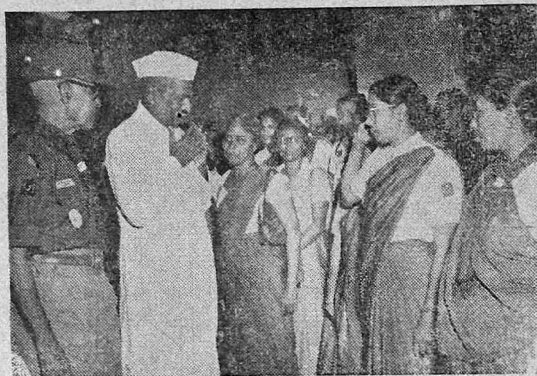

OUR PRESIDENT WITH THE GUIDERS (RAJ BHAVAN, DELHI)

The East Madras Bharat Scouts and Guides conducted their Central Camp for Scouts at Avadi between the 19th and 22nd of September 1952. More than 200 Scouts including several officers attended the camp. A Camp sub committee was formed, with Sri K. S. Ambi Iyer, as Chairman.

The camp was opened on the 19th September at 5 p.m. by Sri Rao Sahib T. R. Kothandarama Mudaliar, Assistant State Commissioner.

Among the items not planned for was a heavy downpour of rain on the midnight of the first day of the camp which the boys stood with cheer and fortitude and which proved them to be in no sense "fair weather Scouts".

The Hon'ble Mr. Justice A. S. P. Aiyar presided on the Visitor's Day, the 21st September. Seventy Patrol Leaders of the North Madras District led by Sri Ram Mohan, the District Commissioner, visited the camp. Sri S. Amudachari, Secretary of the Association welcomed the President. Sri M. D. Janardhan, District Commissioner proposed a vote of thanks. Dr. P. Seshagiri Rao, District Scout Master assisted the District Commissioner.

“There is Great Future for this Movement says President Rajendra Prasad”

President's Appeal for Support.

New Delhi. Oct. 27. President Rajendra Prasad to-day asked the educational authorities to render full assistance to the boy scouts and girl guides movement in India.

Inaugurating a conference here of scout and guide teachers organised by the Bharat Scouts and Guides, Dr. Prasad said, “I have no doubt that there is great future for this movement.”

About 300 scout and guide teachers (Scouters and Guiders) participated in this five-day conference.

The President said there was great defect in the present educational system inasmuch as it afforded little opportunity to students to build their character. Whatever might be the reasons for this defect, the time had come when the educational authorities had to devote more attention to character building. “The institution of scouting, I think, is an institution which goes a great way in removing this deficiency in our educational system. I have, therefore, valued scouting as of great educational importance. I trust, in course of time, it will be possible to have a network of organisations of scouts or of other similar organisations.” Such organisations, he felt could be of great help in enabling students not only to acquire knowledge but build up their character and acquire a habit of rendering service to other people.

The President was sure that public support for the scout movement would follow when the educational authorities gave fillip to the movement.

The President took the salute from troops of scouts and guides. He later went round the camp of the scouters and guiders in a jeep.

Earlier, Pandit Hridaynath Kunzru, National Commissioner of the Bharat Scouts and Guides, welcoming the President, said that India occupied third place in international scouting—the first being the United States and the second, the British Empire. But there was still great scope for improvement in this sphere of imparting moral training to the young boys and girls. This work could be better done if there was enough public support forthcoming. He regretted that scouting was not even recognised even in the extra-curricular activities in schools. Whatever had till now been done in this direction had been done privately.

“It is humiliating to confess”, said Pandit Kunzru, “that we have not received that support from the public that we ought to in view of the service we are trying honestly to render to their children and to the children of the nation.” He hoped that the Secondary Education Commission would be able to devote some attention to this question and make recommendations.”

There should be Crores of Scouts and Guides: Nehru

The Prime Minister, Mr. Jawaharlal Nehru, urged the people to learn to co-operate with each other on a basis of equality, mutual respect and universal brotherhood.

Mr. Nehru was addressing 300 Scout and Guide teachers, who have come here (Delhi) from all over India, for a five-day conference, organised by the Bharat Scouts and Guides to discuss methods of making the Scout and Guide movement more effective.

Mr. Nehru told the Scouters and Guides: "Your motto of service is good. I have no objection to it, but I would like you to develop the spirit to co-operate with others, and work together. Only then will you be able to respect the other man, and win his respect for you."

"The biggest service can be done when you take the other man into confidence; understand him, work with him as your equal without putting on any airs of haughtiness or being above him. Men have to get rid of this idea of high and low, and begin to work together on a basis of equality."

More girl guides needed

Mr. Nehru referred to the number of boy scouts and girl guides, and said that 5,00,000 scouts and 50,000 guides were ridiculously low figures for a big country like India. Their number should run in crores. "This is a good movement, and our endeavour should be to take it to every boy and girl in the country.

"I do not understand why the number of girl guides should be only 50,000. In my opinion, more attention should be given to popularising the movement among the girls, for by doing so you automatically make it popular among the boys too."

Co-operation

The Prime Minister commended the work of the scouts and guides, and said that they could do a real job by instilling in the minds of young boys and girls the spirit of working together, and considering India as a unified whole. This was essential as the "new India of tomorrow can only be built up through co-operation." The five-year plan and the community projects were plans which would lay the foundation of this new India.

Mr. Nehru made special mention of his recent tour of Assam, and the border areas of Manipur and Tripura, and asked the organisers of the Bharat Scouts and Guides to call scouts and guides from Assam to future conferences. The people in those areas had been ignored in the past by

the rest of India, and they should now be specially called, and made to feel that they were an important part of India

"You should get to know the people from Assam" said Mr. Nehru "and they should get to know you. That is important because they are in a far corner of India, and cut off. They should feel that they are parts of India, and are welcomed by you, and by this larger family of this country."

Impressed by Assam

The Prime Minister said: "Now that I have spent a week in Assam I find myself almost unconsciously talking about it always, which shows how much I have been impressed. They are a very fine lot of people, men and women, and more especially women. They are attractive, physically fine types, and intelligent."

The Prime Minister praised the sense of discipline among the tribals of Assam, Manipur, and Tripura, and said that they outshone in this respect the people in the rest of India. The Manipuri dancing was a delight to see and several types of dancing in India paled into insignificance before it. Although he was always partial to people living in the frontier areas and the hills—being himself, at least by descent, a hillman, the trip to Assam had turned out to be very memorable.

Equality

The tribesmen, said Mr. Nehru, were a self-respecting people, and had a high sense of honour. They presented him with many addresses of welcome. None of them was worded in a servile, cringing language. There was no attempt at begging favours in them, and no expressions of fulsome flattery. The addresses breathed equality, and made it very clear that they were welcoming the Prime Minister of India on a basis of equality, and not as a person who was high above them, and they were low people before him.

It was on this basis of friendship and equality that they had to be met if they were so approached they became the best of friends.

"How many people in our country consider these tribal areas and tribesmen as parts of India, which go to make her strong? We generally consider our small area of province as India. This is wrong, while we, in our respective parts, can take pride in things of our own, we should not forget that India's greatness lies in the unity of her peoples."

Mr. Nehru urged the people in India to invite the people from Assam more and more because the latter felt that they were a "new" people. This was not because the British rulers of India had kept the Assamese cut off from rest of the country.

Pandit H. N. Kunzru, National Commissioner of the Bharat Scouts and Guides received Mr. Nehru and took him round the camp. Co. J.S. Wilson, Director of the International Bureau of Scouts, and dame Leslie Whateley, Directress of the Girl Guides and Girl Scouts International Bureau, were introduced to the Prime Minister. "Hindu"

Scouting in America.

U. S. City Organizes Boy Scouts Troop for Handicapped Youth

Reno, Nevada.—Ten-year-old Freddie Wilson wanted, more than anything else, to be a Boy Scout. He talked about it constantly to his parents, his sisters, the children in his neighbourhood in this sunny western city of the United States.

"When I get to be a Boy Scout . . .," he'd declare.

But Freddie is a spastic cripple who spends most of his time in bed. And Scouts are strong, husky boys. So Freddie's burning desire fluttered and all but went out. He gave up hope:

Yet today Freddie is a member of one of the most unusual Boy Scout troops in the world.

Along with two dozen other boys who are the victims of crippling disease and accident, he belongs to a troop that is composed solely of handicapped youngsters.

This new version of Scout work sprang from the experience of a man who saw his own son stricken by disease as a child and subsequently deprived of the experience of a normal boyhood.

When Walter Parson's only son, Bill, was six, he began to suffer from a creeping paralysis. For the past 20 years, Bill has been confined to hospital cot and wheel chair.

Walter Parson's work with the U. S. Government took him all over the world, and he saw youngsters like Bill who were sentenced by diseases and accident to be shut-ins. He was determined to take steps to brighten their long days. After his retirement, he became the local assistant commissioner for Boys Scouts.

The Lone Pine Tribe No. 110 of the Boy Scouts, organized in 1949 with five shut-in boys, is the result of Parson's sympathy, vision, and determination. Parson has had the further satisfaction of seeing the shut-in tribe idea spread to other parts of the United States and abroad.

"Each boy is a long pine," he says, "living his own circumscribed life and learning to stand alone." A Boy Scout pennant bearing the insignia of a single pine tree such as grows on the Sierra Nevada Mountains near Reno hangs in the room of each member of the tribe, a constant reminder of that challenge.

Not only can the shut-ins become Boy Scouts, but they can also with a variety of awards and badges and even become Eagle Scouts, the highest achievement of Scouting.

Despite their handicaps, the shut-in Scouts have earned an impressive number of merit badges in safety, personal health, Public health, citizenship, carpentry, first aid, home repairs, music, leatherwork, telegraphy, stamp collecting, making model airplanes, and even swimming.

The boy's physicians approve of Scout membership for their patients and find the Lone Tree Tribe one of their best helpers in restoring the physical and mental health of their charges.

While the shut-ins can not mean physically to hold meetings they are linked together by specially arranged radio programs in their honor whenever one of their members wins a merit badge.

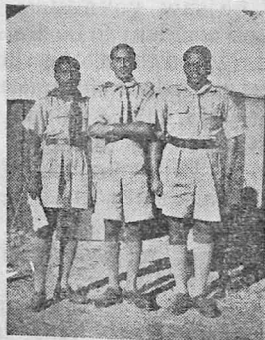
Twice a year the boys get together away from their own homes. Each spring, they attend a special religious service and each summer they are guests at a circus brought to Reno by the Shriners, a national organization which aids crippled children through sponsorship of medical programs and hospital facilities.

Many of the boys get well enough to live a more normal life and often quickly join another Scout troop—one for the physically able. The Shut-in tribe idea has provided handicapped boys with a new purpose in life.
