

Youth Welfare Seminar: A Youth Welfare Seminar run at State Headquarters for Six Saturday evenings has proved very useful for Scouters and Guiders of the City and also representatives of Youth Organisations. Two Committees are working on the problem of under-privileged boys and problem of Youth Welfare. Very good results are expected to come out of these two Committees. Mr. N. E. S. Raghavachari, Director of Community Projects pointed out the role that youth could play in the Community Projects scheme.

HIMALAYA SCOUT WOOD BADGE COURSE

Part II (Practical)

10-5-54 to 21-5-54—Coonoor CAMP CIRCULAR No. 1.

I. The above Course, the first of its kind in Madras after the Merger, will be conducted at the Stanley Park Camping and Training Centre, Coonoor, Nilgiris District from 10th to 21st. May 1954.

II. The Course is open to all Group Leaders, Scoutmasters and Assistant Scoutmasters who have gone through the preliminary Training Course for Scoutmasters and have served as Warranted Scouters for not less than five years. District Commissioners and Assistant District Commissioners who have attended the Commissioners' Training Course or the Preliminary Scouters' Training Course are also welcome A minimum of five years service is also essential in their case.

III Every Camper will provide himself with the following personal equipment:—

- (a) Scout Uniform without Scarf.
- (b) Scout Staff and knot tying ropes
- (c) Note-book and pencil
- (d) One Hurricane Light
- (e) One Haversack or Ruck-Sack
- (f) Scout Knife and Handaxe (if possible)
- (g) Plate and a mug or tumbler
- (h) Clothes for change
- (i) Light Bedding with woollen blankets
- (i) Toilet Requisites.

IV. Every candidate will bring with him the following Books for reference:—

- (a) Scouting for Boys in India
- (b) A.P R.O
- (c) Patrol System
- (d) Boy Scouts by Gilcraft

V. A Camp fee of Rs. 25/- per head is charged. Rs. 10/should be sent in advance with the application and the balance must be paid to the quartermaster on arrival at the Camp.

The application which is available at the State Headquarters must be filled in and returned by the candidate to the undersigned on or before the 1st May 1954. The selected candidate will be notified of the selection in time
