





Indian Red Cross Korean and Non-repatriated Korean Prisoners of war



Henri Dunant Birth Day Celebration

The celebration of the International Red Cross Day on May the 8th, to mark the 126th birth day anniversary of Henri Dunant. As usual therefore it has been decided again to observe this day with all possible earnestness and on a scale greater than last year. A circular in this connection will be issued shortly to the District Branches requesting them to secure the cooperation of the press and publish suitable articles on the Red Cross and Henri Dunant's life and work. The Members of the Junior Red Cross are also requested to participate in the functions organised by the District Branches. They may hold rallies, exhibitions, tournaments and stage health dramas and other functions depicting their various activities. Reports on the celebration received from the Groups in time will be published in the July issue of the Madras Junior.

Reminder to the Groups for the payment of registered in 1953 have not so far been re-registered for 1954. They are requested to send their registration fees before the publication of July issue. Failing which, we are afraid, the July issue will be stopped to them until they pay the registration fees.

### New Year Message for 1954

of

Justice Emil Sandstrom, Chairman of the Board of Governors, League of Red Cross Societies.

Red Cross Members and Red Cross Friends!

The year that has just passed away has been, in a quite special degree, a year of catastrophes caused by nature's unleased forces. Floods, earthquakes, droughts have succeeded each other with great damage to men's life and limb, to his house and goods.

That is to say that it has been a year marked by unceasing work of the Red Cross, in the field of disaster relief, to alleviate suffering and misery. The Red Cross has as always been in the fore-front of the relief work and its achievements have been well up to its high traditions. It has in fact in this field surpassed itself.

At the same time its activity in other fields has continued without interruption, and developed. Noticeable in this respect is the contribution Red Cross teams from different Societies have had to perform in connection with the exchange of prisoners of war in Korea.

An outstanding feature of the year's relief work has been also the ever

increasing contribution to it by the League of Red Cross Societies, which enters now into the 35th year of its existence. The League is, besides the assistance it gives to the Societies in all forms, becoming more and more an active working agent in the relief field, accomplishing the necessary co-ordination, a task which becomes the more important the bigger the catastrophe and the more extensive the relief work is. In the relief action of the bygone year the League's performances have been of the greatest value.

The Red Cross has in an indeed singular way shown its usefulness and necessity during the year. It is very gratifying to be able to make this statement in my NEW YEAR MESSAGE. I congratulate the Red Cross Societies and the League and all and everyone, Red Cross Member or supporter, who has contributed to the excellent result, which I hope, will induce to continued and increased efforts.

With this hope I wish you all, Red Cross members and friends, a happy and successful NEW YEAR.

## Broadcast Message from Monsieur Paul Ruegger, President, International Committee of the Red Cross, for the New Year 1954.

Five years ago, sixty one States signed in Geneva the four conventions for the protection of war victims. Following a generous impulse, the drafts proposed by the International Committee of the Rcd Cross were accepted by Governments representing every political opinion. There was hope therefore that all non-combatants would at last be assured of the protection which universal humanitarian sentiment demands.

The procedure of ratification of these Conventions is, however, too slow, especially in the case of the greatest powers. The founder organisation of the universel movement of the Red Cross considers that it must impress upon the powers the importance of ratifying these treaties, of endorsing the obligations which they incurred when endeavouring to give a wider scope to the Geneva Conventions. Thus

they will give the world a further proof of their desire for peace, whilst at the same time assuring their citizens that as far as individual protection promised by treaty can be assured, in case of war, this will be done.

It must be hoped that, in the same spirit they will also make progress towards finding solution to the great problem of the protection of civilian populations against weapons of massive and indiscriminate destruction-a problem, towards the solution of which the International Committee in Geneva has never ceased to invite its undivided attention and the study of which it will continue to pursue in the hope of a better. future.

India was one of the first few countries to ratify the 19:9 Geneva Conventions. Its ratification is dated 9th November 1950.

# Indian Red Cross Korean Unit and Non-repatriated Prisoners of War

Indian Red Cross Korean Unit, after having so well performed the difficult International Assignment given to it, arrived by S. S. Austrias at Madras on the 21st February 1954. Along with the Unit came some of the non-repatriated prisoners of war, who were brought to India at their request to go to neutral countries. A fitting welcome was given to the Unit on its arrival at the Madras Harbour. The Government of Madras arranged a reception to the Unit at the Harbour, when all Red Cross members and others

participated in it. For the benefit of the non-repatriated Korean P. O. W.'s the Head-quarters, New Delhi, sent 88 gift bags, each containing the following items, viz. barley sugar, tooth-powder, hairoil, combs, playing cards, handkerchiefs, soap (toilet), writing pad and envelopes, chocolates, pencils, and soap (shaving). These were distributed to them. A photograph was taken after the distribution, which is published elsewhere in this issue.

## Government of Madras acts on Parulekar Committee's Recommendations on Junior Red Cross Counsellor's Training for Elementary School Teachers

We understand that the Government of Madras is taking steps to implement the recommendations of the Parulekar Committee on Elementary Education to provide Junior Red Cross Training for children in elementary schools. The Madras State Red Cross Branch was recently invited to send a representative

to serve on a committee for planning the details of a scheme for a State-wide training of elementary school teachers, as Junior Red Cross Counsellors. The recommendations of this committee are understood to the under the consideration of the Government.

## Instructions and Syllabus for conducting Junior Red Cross Counsellors' Training Courses

Following the conduct of a Pilot Training Course for Junior Red Cross Counsellors by the Madras City Branch during August and September 1953, the revised syllabus has now been finalised and approved by the Junior Red Cross Sub-Committee of the Madras State Copies of the Instructions Branch Syllabus have been provided in booklet form and Secretaries of District Branches and Convenors of District Junior Red Cross Sub-Committees have been furnished with cop'es. Additional copies can be had on payment of THREE ANNAS each from the Honorary Secretary, Madras State Branch, Indian Red Cross Society, Monteith Road, Egmore, Madras-7.

The Instructions and Syllabus are intended for the use only of Secretaries of District Branches and Convenors of District Junior Red Cross Sub-Committees, and lecturers and instructors who participate in the conduct of training courses. Therefore they are not meant to be issued or sold to trainees. The booklet is to be used in conjunction with the literature listed on its pages 4 and 5, without which the information cannot be regarded as complete.

We are happy to inform Secretaries and Convenors that the booklet has met with the appreciation of the Headquarters, New Delhi, and that at their instance we have been sending copies to several States in India.

## Special Exchange Plan

We publish for information of the Junior Red Cross Groups the following which has been sent to all the Red Cross District and Sub-branches and the District Junior Red Cross Sub-Committiees.


In order to stimulate international school correspondence the League of Red Cross Societies has evolved a "SPECIAL EXCHANGE PLAN" as follows:

- Six National Junior Red Cross Sections have been grouped together and as far as our Society is concerned they are Austria, Denmark, Germany, India, Italy and Japan,
- Each National Section has to provide 15 albums for despatch as soon as possible, not later than May 1954;
- 3 Three of these albums will be sent to each of the other five participating sections;
- 4. The pairings will be made at the Central Headquarters of the Society concerned and will mark the beginning of an exchange of correspondence.

Composition of albums -The albums should be of normal size, roughly 12" x 14" and not more than  $1\frac{1}{2}$  lbs. in weight. The contents should be of a general nature and adequate space should be given to Junior Red Cross and Red Cross activities.

In commending the above plan to us for implementation, the Headquarters has requested us to co-operate with them by taking steps and send them the albums from our Juniors before the schools close for the summer vacations.

We therefore invite the cooperation and support of the Junior Red Cross Groups both in the Andhra and Madras States and request them to prepare and send the albums as specified above to Honorary Director, Junior Red Cross, Indian Red Cross Society, Madras State Branch, Monteith Road, Egmore, Madras-8 by the 15th of April 1954 at the latest for transmission to Headquarters, New Delhi.



#### Strength of Groups

The number of registered Groups in this State including Andhra in the year ending December 1953 is 2,602 as against 2 937 in 1952The decrease is mainly due to the fall in the registration of groups in Madurai district. We must therefore try to show an appreciable increase in the number of registrations in the current This may be achieved if every Group takes a keen interest in getting itself reregistered during the year in time and in getting a larger number of new Groups registered. ## Report from Junior Red Cross Sub - Committees

#### 1. Chingleput.

Junior RedCross Counsellors Training course, Chin, leput. Sri T. P. Santhanakrishna Nayudu, Principal, Teachers College, Saidapet, and Honorary Director, Madras State Junior Red Cross, presided over the valedictory meeting of the Junior Red Cross Counsellors' Training Course, held on Tuesday at the Alison Cassie School, Chingleput.

He congratulated the district branch on the organisation of the Training Course, and the good work that was being done.

Sri. R. Messiah Doss, Convenor, District Sub-Committee, in his report, stated that 40 pupil-teachers of the local Government Training School, took the training and did social service such as slum clearance, and visiting hospitals.

Srimathi Saraswathi Doraiswami, District Educational officer, and President of the District Committee, presented Attendance Certificates to the trainees The J. R. C. Group of St Columbia's Elementary School, held an entertainment.

Sri T. R Swamikannu, Headmaster, Government Training School, proposed the vote of thanks.

#### 2. Madras City

The Junior Red Cross Organiser of the Corporation of Madras reports that Junior Red Cross Rallies were conducted in 4 ranges in the City on four days viz 20th, 21st, 25th and 27th January 1954. About 3800 Juniors and 507 Counsellors from the Corporation Slum Schools in different parts of the City participated in the rallies.

#### 3. Tanjore East (Nagapattinam)

A monthly meeting of the District Junior Red Cross Sub-Committee Tanjore East, Nagapattinam was held on Tuesday the 9th March, 1954, under the Presidentship of Sri. J. A. Ryan, M.A., B.T., District Educational Officer, Tanjore East. The Committee passed many resolutions. re: the conduct of a Training Course for Junior Red Cross Counsellors Of these the following are worth mentioning:—

- Resolved to conduct a Training Course for Counsellors.
- 2. Resolved that a fee of Rs. 3/- be levied on each trainee.
- 3. Resolved to accept with thanks the offer made generously by Sri. V. Subramania Iver to make up the extra.
- 4. Resolved to invite applications up to a maximum of 30, from teachers through managements.
- Resolved that the Counsellor's Training commence on the 3rd of April, and the first meeting to be held in the National High School.
- 6. Resolved to place on record the Committee's high appreciation of the work turned out by the Junior Red Cross Group, Board High School, Tiruvarur, as to merit the first prize in the Lady Nye Award for the whole State in the year 1953.

At the end of the meeting Dr. E. R. Menon, one of the members of the Committee, gave a short account of his experience with the members of the Junior Red Cross at the War Front and concluded his talk with practical suggestions for the efficient working of the Junior Red Cross in peace time.

## News From Groups

#### Arcot (South).

### Muthiah Elementary School, Panruti.

The Counsellor of the Junior Red Cross Group of the above school writes that the group celebrated it second anniversary on the 1st February 1954 under the presidentship of Dr. A M. Natesan, L.M P. Sri. P. Sivanesan, B.A., B.T., Teacher, Municipal High School, Panruti, delivered a lecture on "Junior Red Cross and its activities". A drama on "Service" was staged by the Juniors on the occasion.

#### Coimbatore:

### District Board Elementary School, Kanniyadi.

The Junior Red Cross Group conducted its monthly meeting on the 29th January 1954, when one of the members presided. After the minutes of the previous meeting were passed, some of the members addressed the meeting on "Friendship".

#### Madras City.

#### Hindu Theological High School Madras.

The Headmaster of the Hindu Theological High School, Madras writes that the members of the Deena Bandhu Sangam of the school, undertook the distribution of milk to the poor students out of the allotment of milk powder made to the institution by the Red Cross Society. The distribution was inaugurated on the 22nd February 1954 by Sri T. P. Santanakrishna Naidu, Honorary Director, Junior Red Cross. In the course of his inaugural address, the Director paid a tribute to the work done by the school and expressed the hope that it would further enlarge its sphere of service to the poor children by the scheme of milk distribution and he concluded his speech by suggesting to the students to prepare an album containing pictures. photographs etc., relating to the life and condition of the Indian children and send it on to America through the Red Cross Organisation.

#### Teachers College Model High School, Saidapet

The Junior Red Cross Group of the Teacher's College Model High School, Saidapet,

celebrated the Annual Group Day on the 9th April 1954 by a programme consisting of the running of a canteen, the conducting of a Junior Red Cross Exhibition and the enacting of a health play entitled "The Girl who Hated Milk". Sri A. Padmanaba Naidu, Chief Inspector of Physical Education, Madras, and a Member of the State Junior Red Cross Subcommittee, presided. Sri. T P Santanakrishna Naidu, Principal, Teacher's College, Saidapet and Honorary Director, Junior Red Cross, Madras State Branch, welcomed the President and the visitors. The President in his Address appealed to the Juniors to cultivate the spirit and habit of service. Sri Ganesamurthi, Headmaster of the school, who is taking a keen interest in the progress of the Junior Red Cross Group, proposed a vote of thanks. A considerable number of parents of the Juniors who attended were among those function.

#### Madurai

#### Sancta Fatima's Higher Elementary Training School, Mettupatti, Dindigul

The Correspondent of the school writes that the Junior Red Cross Group of the school celebrated the Red Cross Week for five days. Members staged a health drama on the occation and distributed slates and sweets free to the poor students.

#### Board High School, Autoor

The Headmaster writes that the Junior Red Cross Group celebrated Red Cross Week for two days. On the first day of the celebration students carried a Cleaning Campaign procession and conducted a public meeting, which



was presided over by Sri. B. R. Ramanathan, B.A.L.T. Sri V. Venkataramalingam addressed the meeting on Junior Red Cross and its duty. On the second day Red Cross Day was celebrated when hundi collections and enrolment of members were made. A sum of Rs. 10/. was sent to the Red Cross District Branch, Madurai, as a donation from the Group from the hundi collections made. A meeting was also organised under the presidentship of Sri. S Krishnamurthy Lycr, Mirasdar. Dr. A. Palaniappan, L.M.P., Rural Medical Practitioner, Sithayankottai, addressed the meeting on Health and First Aid. A health drama was also staged by the pupils on the occasion.

#### Ramanathapuram.

#### R. Ramaswamy Chettiar Higher Elementary School, Natarajapuram, Yia Nattarasankottai

The Counsellor writes that there are 105 members in the Group. It is divided into 4 sections: (1) to look after the cleanliness of the school; (2) to promote friendliness among the pupils, (3) to render first aid; (4) to supply drinking water. When a house in the village suddenly caught fire, the members immediately rushed to the spot and brought it under control. Members took preventive measures when typhoid was prevalent in the place. They have laid down a programme of a work to be carried on for 1954.

#### Tanjore.

#### Board High School, Tiruvarur

The members of the Junior Red Cross Group of the school have undertaken to distribute the milk which was donated by the American National Red Cross Society, to the poor. The distribution was inaugurated by Dr. B. Govindaraj Shenoi, Listrict Medical Officer, Tanjore, on the 6th February 1954 when Home Nursing certificates of the St. John Ambulance Association were awarded to the successful girl students.

#### Municipal Higher Elementary School Saurashtra Street, Tanjore

The Councellor writes that the Group is divided into six sections to attend to the following activities:—school cleanliness, personal cleanliness of the children, drinking

water facilities, etc. etc., The Group conducts meetings twice a month. Books, pencils, etc., were purchased and the cost of medicines for the first aid equipment is also met from the fund.

#### R. C. Fatima School, Tiruyarur
