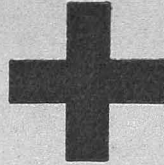
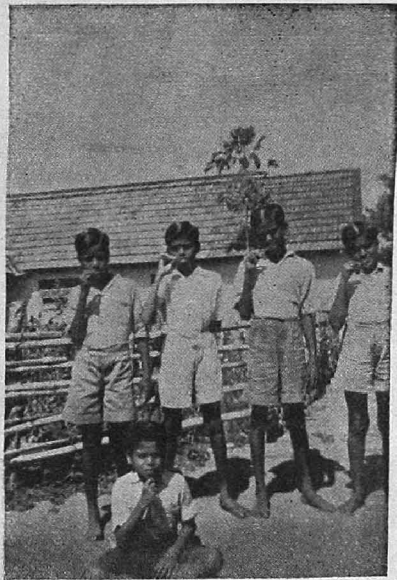

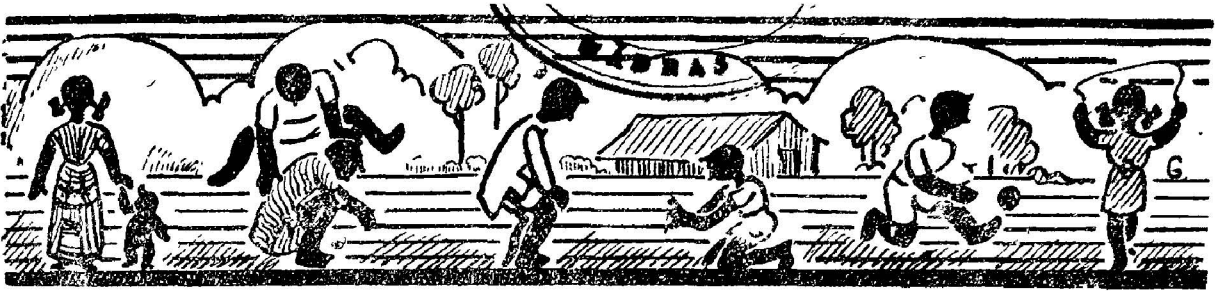

We have pleasure in publishing for the information the Members of the Junior Red Cross Groups a letter received from Tobe Shanok (girl, aged 12), United States of America.

MY DEAR INDIAN FRIENDS,

In America there are quite a few kinds of games. There is base-ball, basket-ball and soccer. One of the games which is an indoor sport is called Ping-Pong or Table Tennis. The game that has finished for this year is Foot-ball which is played during the months of September, October and November. Every Saturday there are many people from all over the United States in New Haven to see the game. I live very close to where they play which is at Yale Bowl. The game that has finished for last summer and is again coming back is base-ball. It starts in early April and goes through the summer until early September. The Yankees won the world series, that is when the champion teams in America meet and play a series of games. I was told the schools in India are about the same as in America. We study Geography, English, Art, Mathematics and Science. At the end of the week which is Friday the classes have a study period. It is called Office Hour. Anybody who has not completed his or her work or misbehaves goes back to that room. The Junior High School where I am in has many different classes. For each study we

have to go to a different room and have a different teacher.

In America there are different holidays. There is chanukkah for the Jewish people and Christmas for the Christians. Chanukkah is celebrated by lighting one candle each night for eight nights besides the shomas which is the head candle. Christmas is celebrated by having an ever-green tree and putting light bulbs on it which are round and of different colours. Also there are trimmings and stockings are hung upon the fire-place. Santa Claus (which is a legend) brings for the children and fills up their socks late at night.

There is Easter for the Christians and Passover for the Jews. On Easter children paint eggs and also for fun sometimes people hide eggs that have chocolate coverings and marshmellow inside. Passover means when the Jews were enslaved in Egypt to Pharaoh, the angels one night passed over the houses. The houses that had a stain of goats blood on the side of the door were known to the angels to be the houses of the Jews. The other houses were the Egyptians. So the Egyptians were punished for enslaving the Jews in Egypt.

THE "NALWA MEDAL"

The Nalwa Medal was instituted to commemorate the memory of the late I S Nalwa, I.M.S. (Retired), Joint Secretary of the Indian Red Cross Society Headquarters, who met with a fatal accident in 1948 while on a humanitarian mission to the Jammu area. This All-India Medal was instituted with the object of being awarded annually to a trained nurse, nursing aide, health visitor or an organiser of nursing activities who is adjudged by the Society as having distinguished herself in serving the suffering. In 1951 the medal was awarded to Smt I. J. Dhruviam, a nurse attached to the Jothi Nilayam Rural Centre, Muttathur, South Arcot District, who, without the aid of the doctor or other nurse, had ministered to the needs of hundreds of villagers every year. The medal for the second time was awarded to our State to

another nurse, the recipient being Miss Grace Isaac, Government General Hospital, Bellary. It was awarded to her in recognition of her outstanding services in the cause of nursing at the time of the outbreak of plague in the Bellary District.

The medal for the third time also was awarded to our State and this time the award went to Mr. P. Kunian, a male nurse working in the Government Lady Willingdon Leprosy Sanatorium, Chingleput, in recognition of his services in the cause of Leprosy Nursing. The Medal was presented to Mr. Kunian by Dr. A. Lakshmanasamy Mudaliar, President of the Indian Red Cross Society, Madras State Branch, at the Annual General Meeting of the Society. We congratulate Mr. Kunian for the award and wish him continued success in the years to come.

EDUCATION AND PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT (EDUCATION)

G.O. No 907, 6th May, 1936

Elementary Education Fund—Junior Red Cross Groups in Elementary Schools—
Expenditure on Registration Fees—Debit—Permitted.

READ—the following papers :—

From the Inspector of Municipal Councils and Local Boards, dated 3rd February, 1936, R.O.C. No 41;299/35-A-7.

From the Director of Public Instruction, dated 20th February, 1936, R.O.C. No 585-B/36.

Order No. 906, Education, dated 6th May, 1936.

The Government are pleased to permit local bodies to debit to the Elementary Education Funds under their control, the fees paid for the affiliation of Junior Red Cross Groups in Elementary Schools under them to the Junior Red Cross Society. The following addition will be made to the annexure to G.O. No 1290, Education, dated 25th July, 1933, as item VII (c) —

<i>Item of Expenditure</i>	<i>Conditions under which expenditure may be incurred</i>
VII (c) Organization of Junior Red Cross Groups.	A local body may incur expenditure from the Elementary Education Fund on the Registration Fees of Junior Red Cross Groups in Elementary Schools under it without the sanction of Government. Other expenses connected with the organisation of these Groups should be met from private subscriptions.

CRAFT ALLOWANCE

GOVERNMENT OF MADRAS.

EDUCATION AND PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

G.O. No. 2392—*Education (Press)*, dated 22nd July, 1949.

*Education—Teachers under Government and Local Bodies—Payment of craft allowance—
Further orders passed.*

ORDER :

In connection with the revision of pay of teachers in Government and Local Body Schools a special allowance called "Craft Allowance" in addition to the time scales of pay was first sanctioned by Government. Subsequently it was decided that the craft allowance need not be paid separately but that it should be merged in the time-scale of pay. It was also laid down that teachers who had not qualified themselves in any of the crafts should acquire the qualification within a period of two years.

Persons possessing the following certificates issued by the Boy Scouts Association, the Hindustan Scout Association and the JUNIOR RED CROSS ASSOCIATION will be considered as qualified in craft :—

- (a) Scout Masters
- (b) Cub Masters.
- (c) Rover Leaders.
- (d) Blue Bird Flock Leaders.
- (e) Scout Leaders.
- (f) JUNIOR RED CROSS COUNSELLORS.

PERMISSION TO OFFICERS OF THE EDUCATION DEPARTMENT TO PARTICIPATE IN RED CROSS WORK

As some Officers of the Education Department whom the Red Cross Society invited to participate in its activities expressed a desire to obtain the necessary permission from Government under Government Servants' Conduct Rules, we publish below for their information and for the information of other Officers who may desire to participate in Red Cross work the following abstract of the orders of Government conferring general permission and the conditions attached to it :—

dated 24th January, 1949.*

*Abstract.—Government Servants' Conduct
Rules—Officers of Education Department—*

Permitted to serve in Red Cross, Boy Scouts and Girl Guides Organisations.

Read —From the Director of Public Instruction No. 700-A-4/48 dated 18—11—1948 and No. 707-A-4/4, dated 24—11—1948.

Order .—The Officers of the Education Department who are invited and who desire to take up work connected with the Red Cross Society or the Boy Scouts and the Girl Guides Associations are permitted to take up such work in an *honorary capacity*—subject to the condition that it does not interfere with their official duties and that they do not participate either directly or indirectly in the collection of subscriptions or donations for the organisations.

**ALL-INDIA JUNIOR RED CROSS "INTERNATIONAL SCHOOL ART"
COMPETITION 1954.**

1. Competing Groups are asked to make pictures or drawings depicting one or more aspects of Junior Red Cross ideals, or scenes and sceneries, local environment, school life, games and sports, social customs, new national development projects, or anything which may be typically Indian and which is likely to be of interest to children in other countries.
2. A Group may send in any number of entries.
3. The Name, Address, Age and Educational Standard of the competing Junior must be given on each entry.
4. The competition is open to Junior Red Cross Groups, hence each entry should be submitted on behalf of the competing Junior's group.
5. Each entry should be certified by the head of the institution as being the Junior's own work done on behalf of his or her group.
6. The minimum size of the actual picture should be approximately 12"×9" and the maximum 30"×20"
7. Due credit will be given to the subject chosen, the colour scheme and general impression that it conveys.
8. In adjudging the result of the competition special attention will be paid to neatness and good presentation
9. The competing groups will be divided into two categories, viz.,
A—High Schools and Colleges.
B—Middle and Primary Schools.
10. Prizes—The following prizes will be awarded to successful entries —
For those under A :

I Prize	..	Rs. 50
II "	..	" 30
III "	..	" 20

For those under B :

I Prize	..	Rs. 40
II "	..	" 20
III "	..	" 15
- Five Consolation prizes of Rs. 5 each will be awarded to entries selected from both categories.
11. The prizes will be sent to successful groups to be used as they desire. There is no objection to the winning groups distributing the prizes among the individual contributors
12. The entries must be forwarded to the Honorary Director, Junior Red Cross, Indian Red Cross Society, Madras State Branch, Egmore, Madras-8 by the 30th September, 1954 at the latest for transmission to the Headquarters, New Delhi.

(The Editor will be glad to receive as many entries as possible for this competition and hopes that our Junior Red Cross groups will come out very creditably in the Competition.)

Our Headquarters publish interesting Posters in Red Cross without vernacular captions suitable to our State. We have, therefore, suggested them to print Posters with vernacular languages for our use, to which they have agreed. According to our suggestion they have now sent one of the photographic copies of our posters which they are now producing, and a copy of it is reproduced here for the information of the District Branches. Headquarters say that they could supply the printed poster with Tamil lettering, if we are prepared to place an indent for not less than 5,000 copies which will cost about Rs. 1,000. As we have to depend mostly on our District Branches to find a sale for the posters, we could not accept the Headquarters terms before we make sure of the exact requirements of our Branches. We, therefore, appeal to all the District and Sub-Branches to kindly let us know their requirements so that we may inform our Headquarters whether we are in a position to accept the offer or not. The District and Sub-Branches are requested, therefore, to send their replies as early as possible to the Honorary Secretary, Indian Red Cross Society, Madras State Branch, Egmore, Madras.

JUNIOR RED CROSS TRAINS FOR THE FUTURE AND IS A PREPARATION FOR LIFE, WHICH IS REAL EDUCATION.

Education is the preparation for life. That which provides for all-progress among boys is real education. The children of to-day are the citizens of tomorrow. They are the fathers and mothers of the future. They constitute the nation's reserve and are the trustees of posterity. So it is absolutely necessary that they should be given real education which includes not only instruction but good training on proper lines. Training should be given in such a way that there is physical development side by side with intellectual progress. Besides, the seed for spiritual development should also be sown in the minds of children. Ideas sown during this formative period of children's life take deep root, grow into words and deeds. Good habits are eventually formed in them so that they may be the most efficient and useful citizens to exercise their rights and privileges and do their duties in the interests of themselves and of the State. Junior Red Cross is the best possible movement which aims at giving such training to produce useful workers to the community and the State.

Junior Red Cross is a non-political, non-religious, non-sectarian and international movement which provides for the promotion of health, prevention of disease and mitigation of sufferings among people in times of war and peace. Like the Boy Scout Movement, it instills in the minds of children the spirit of service. The motto of the Junior Red Cross is "I serve". This Movement is also of great assistance in removing blindness and spreading the sight-saving movement in schools. The teacher who is the counsellor is the pivot round which the entire movement of the Junior Red Cross revolves and he is the real educator.

In a free country like India, the most important work to be attended to is the health of its citizens. Healthy mind is also the effect of a healthy body. A sound mind can exist only in a sound body. Hence any intellectual progress among children should be preceded by physical growth. Correct health habits should be formed in them. The teaching of correct health habits is the most important item in the training of children and the rules of the Health Games are the best means for preaching the principles of Health.

The members of The Junior Red Cross group not only keep themselves clean in body and mind but also try to foster the Health principles in their school and the village or the locality where they happen to live. The idea of sympathetic understanding of the conditions of people in other lands and their difficulties and the love for international contact by means of correspondence and exchange of portfolios are best inculcated in the minds of Young children. Any World War, which, people say, is threatening us, can best be avoided if the spirit of international love is developed in the minds of citizens of the world.

There is scope for activity which is the best way of training children to be active and useful to the society at large. Children are not passive but real workers who imbued with the spirit of service. In times of peace and war they render useful service since they get very good training in First Aid and Home Nursing. Needless to say, the members of The Junior Red Cross become active members of the Senior Red Cross which does the splendid work of attending

the wounded and the injured in battle-fields. Even when the battle is raging terribly, the Red Cross Volunteers, bearing their flag of the International Red Cross, can do their work undisturbedly without any fear of being hurt. In this direction the example set by Florence Nightingale, the Lady with the Lamp, is unique. World friendliness and world-sympathy can best be imbibed by these non-political workers who care for the real progress of mankind.

The educational value of the Junior Red Cross has now largely been recognised by the educational authorities all over the world. Junior Red Cross activities lay special emphasis on the practice of health habits and pave the way to train the child in personal health and hygiene. He is trained to improve the sanitary condition of his school and locality. By disinterested service to the sick and wounded or suffering he is educated in civic consciousness.

In the field of hygiene, the Junior Red Cross translates the theory of hygiene into practice. The magazines and albums received from other countries enable children to have an idea of the history of the people of the other parts of the world. Geographical conditions of other countries are best illustrated in the foreign albums and they are

the best means of acquiring correct knowledge since we get materials from the source itself. The Junior Red Cross helps in the revival of the national art. There is the appreciation of national art and skill and thus the aesthetic sense is developed in the children. This movement also creates an incentive for needle-work and other kinds of hand-work.

The Junior Red Cross inter-school correspondence provides an opportunity for young children to communicate their feelings and ideas in the best possible language known to them. The preparation of an album for international exchange lends subjects for English Composition and Essay writing. The spirit of emulation also enables them to do their work perfectly when the best Essay is given a place in the portfolio.

The Red Cross Society creates a healthier and happier generation of men and women pledged to a programme of health, service and world-friendliness which are the fruits of real and humanizing education.

Hence, will it be too much to say that it is the duty of the children of the State to support it by joining the movement in large numbers thereby benefitting themselves and their country?

South Arcot District.—

This district did not have a Junior Red Cross Sub-Committee till now. A meeting of prominent Educationists and the District Educational Officer was held and a District Junior Red Cross Sub-Committee was formed with Rev. Fr. Gnanaprakasam as its Convener and the District Educational Officer as its Chairman.

Our Honorary Director during his tours in the Districts has often been asked queries by the Junior Red Cross Members about our Organisation and queries on the same subject are also received from many of our readers of the Madras Junior. Though we feel that it is our duty to answer the queries, we are unable to reply to every one individually. We are, therefore, pleased to open a page in the Journal and to publish important queries pertaining to Junior Red Cross with our answers for the information of all of our readers. We publish in this issue the answers for the queries received so far.

QUERIES.

1. What is the registration fee for a Junior Red Cross Group in Elementary and Higher Elementary Schools ?
2. Do you accept if a Group which fails to register during 1953, pays the registration fee in 1954 for both the years viz., 1953 and 1954 ?
3. Can the members of the District Junior Red Cross Sub-Committee be allowed to draw travelling allowance from State funds for the Journeys made by them in connection with the Junior Red Cross work ?

ANSWER.

The annual registration fee for both the Ele. and Higher Ele. Schools is the same viz. Re. 1/- only. The registration fee for High Schools and Colleges is Rs. 2/- only.

The Society's financial year counts every year from 1st January to 31st December. Registration fee for the year is payable only within that year. So registration fees received from the groups in 1954 for the year 1953 will not be accepted.

Travelling allowance cannot be drawn from the State funds for journeys made in connection with the Junior Red Cross either by the officials or by non-officials as the work is honorary. It is customary for the Inspecting Officers to do their Junior Red Cross organising work in the course of their normal tours without incurring any additional cost to the Government. The Junior Red Cross Counsellors may be paid their actual expenses from the funds of the Junior Red Cross Sub-Committee which retains 80% of the registration fees collected in the district for its propaganda work, etc.

We have been informed by the Headquarters, New Delhi that they have revised the book entitled "To Wives and Mothers" and that it has been published in Hindi and made it available at a cost of Re. 1-8-0 per copy. The Book may be obtained direct from the Stores Officer, Maternity and Child Welfare Stores Depot., Indian Red Cross Road, New Delhi. It is a valuable publication and will be very useful to those women who lead family life. District Branches who wish to order for the book may send in their indents direct to this Stores Officer.

TANJORE (WEST)

The Convener of the District Junior Red Cross Sub-Committee reports that at the time of the 44th Madras State Educational Conference held from 26th to 29th May 1954 a Junior Red Cross Exhibition was conducted. The Junior Red Cross exhibit box lent by the State Branch for the purpose was found very useful. The exhibits were displayed beautifully in the stall and these were supplement-
