EDITOR'S INTRODUCTION

The Indian Historical Review has served the historian's community since 1974. It is perhaps the only journal of its kind in India that has been published continuously for thirty-five years. In those years, significant changes have occurred in the world of academic journals, both on the supply side and demand side. Technological change has posed an inescapable alternative before us: change or perish. The cyber path has already become the main channel of communication among our authors and expert referees and our editorial staff. Printers expect soft copies for easier preparation of camera-ready copies. Many new skills are needed to keep up with progress in the modalities and standards of production, in line with other journals of its kind. These skills are not easily available to organisations in the public sector, given their pay scales and governmental injuctions against creation of new posts as well as better employment opportunities in the private sector. Outsourcing is expensive. I understand that there are also changes on the demand side; for example, many subscribers, particularly institutions in other countries, prefer to subscribe to an electronic version of journals rather than a paper copy for reasons of space-saving and easier access. Moreover, in the last two decades, readership has expanded in many countries that were not significant participants in Indian studies earlier. For all these reasons, the committee appointed by the Indian Council of Historical Research decided to recognise the need for change and took on board SAGE Publications, which has managing arrangements with the Indian Economic and Social History Review, Studies in History, and a large number of academic journals in India. While printing and distribution tasks are assigned to SAGE, the ICHR will continue to be responsible for all editorial functions.

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The IHR will continue to be one of the few journals in India with an elaborate system of referral of all contributions to experts. We hope to have continued support and advice from our expert referees.

The IHR will continue to serve a broad range of research interest in Indian history from early times to contemporary history, and in the various specialisations or sub-disciplines which have developed in the area of historical studies. Unlike 1974, when the journal began publication, today we have many specialised journals, for example, in Marine Archaeology, Gender History, Indian Ocean Studies, and the like. The ICHR extends financial support to many of these specialised journals, while the *Indian Historical*

Review will continue to address the whole spectrum of interests which push forward research in Indian history in our times.

The IHR will continue to be available to individual subscribers at a relatively low price. The price of the journal was raised more than ten years ago. The concerned committee of the ICHR Council considered the fact that since the last price revision inflation has raised the cost of production while the average earning of our readers has also gone up, the committee negotiated with the new printer and distributor, SAGE Publications, a new subscription rate which remains fairly low compared to other academic journals with comparable standards of production and quality of writings published. Individual subscribers are urged to subscribe on an annual basis since the purchase of single copies will cost more than the subscription price, till now, due to a shortcoming in the journal's distribution system, many readers used to opt for purchasing a single copy from time to time, instead of subscribing on an annual basis. They need to be alerted that this is now a bad bargain.

Through these continuities and changes we have to negotiate our journal to a new phase of its life.
